

Revised Forecast for Financial Results for the First Two Quarters of Fiscal 2008

We have revised our forecast for financial results for the first two quarters of fiscal 2008 (from April 1, 2008 to September 30, 2008) which were published on May 21, 2008.

The net incurred losses due to natural disasters are expected be smaller than the initial forecast. Mainly for this reason, we have revised upward the forecast regarding ordinary profit and net income for the first two quarters of Fiscal 2008.
